
## Reading: High Frequency Words

High frequency words are words which occur frequently when speaking or reading. Some high frequency words can be sounded out, 'and', 'can', 'up' and some are tricky words which cannot be easily read using phonics, 'the', 'said', 'was'. Sound them out and find the part that

is tricking you and remember it.

Sometimes, the meaning of the high frequency words is difficult to explain as they usually have an abstract meaning. It is easy to understand 'cat' for example but not so easy to understand 'the'.



When you add this to learning phonics, children's reading can really be accelerated.

## Learning High Frequency Words

- Make flashcards get your child to write the words if possible.
- Place HFW on the stairs and read them each time you go upstairs.
- Hide HFW around the room, who can find the most? Read them out.
- Splat the HFW with fly squatters.
- Place 4 HFW in the corners of the room and run to the word called out.
- Play Lucky dip!
- Play snap!
- Write them in chalk onto a hopscotch grid. Read them as you throw the stone onto them.
- Play bingo with them.
- Point them out when reading a bedtime story.
- Put a few on a tray, hide one and ask which one is missing.
- Play treasure hunt with HFW flash cards.
- Write letters on building blocks/ lego and spell out HFW.
- Write the words on lolly sticks and practise 1 a day from the pot.
- Write the words on the bottom of bath toys (ducks/ boats) to find and read.
